Strengthening Parishes...

Many people equate the term stewardship with financial contribution. However, in our parish life, it is much broader than that. The foundation of stewardship is our worship experience, gathering around the Eucharist in a communal demonstration of faith and solidarity. From this comes the motivation to become more actively involved in the parish, and to share our strengths.

The varied parishes in our diocese have many creative and fruitful approaches to stewardship. At Holy Family, the parish leadership chose to invest in the "Living Your Strengths" program. This was facilitated by a grant from the Catholic Foundation. This program is designed to help individuals recognize their strengths and share them with the community.

Coordinator Rosella Blalock says, "Those who have been through the program are now asking something more, something deeper. People are wanting to continue to develop what they have started."



The four-phased goal beautifully embraces the continuum of stewardship: 1) increased attendance at Mass, 2) more people actively involved in ministry, 3) increased financial support, and 4) stronger more integrated community.

St. Lucy approached their stewardship program through an integrated leadership training seminar. This method recognizes that stewardship is not just a fiscal function, but also a broad "ownership" of all aspects of parish life, leading to a willingness and desire to participate more fully. They invited Thomas P. Sweetser, SJ, the founder of the Parish Evaluation Project, to lead their seminar. The seminar was held in July 2011. Since that time the parish has increased their investment in the process and the results are tangible: This year at their volunteer recognition event they had a record number of attendees!

At our core we are a worship community. By developing and contributing our gifts, we make that community vibrant and strong.

Caring for the Community...

Jesus left us with three clear mandates: Love God, Love each other, and Care for the poor.

The Catholic Community has a rich heritage of outreach. In Santa Clara County the largest non-government provider of human services is our Catholic family. Every one of our worship communities works to improve the life of its neighbors.

Through our Parish Outreach Fund, the Foundation is able to provide financial assistance for many of these great programs. The parishes serve a continuum of needs:

At Sacred Heart of Jesus, children participate in an after school homework program. The program has been providing support to children and families for over 35 years. Three current volunteers, Marianna Barba, Carla Garcia and Paula Garcia are former participants in the homework program who have all graduated from Santa Clara University.

Seniors make up a large portion of the communities of St. William and St. Nicholas Parishes. In 2010, anticipating the need to augment pastoral care to this growing population and to the entire Catholic Community in north Los Altos, they obtained a grant from the Foundation to train volunteers in the Stephens Ministry Program.


The community at St. Maria Goretti reaches out to neighbors at a most vulnerable time, and strives to be a "beacon of hope." The Encuentro Juvenil Con Cristo (Youth Group) expresses their gratitude on behalf of the parish who used their grant to help homeless and day workers.

Investing in our tuture...

It is commitment to one another through Christ that sustains our Catholic community. One key aspect of this is the nurturing of the faithful across all age groups, recognizing that needs, motivation and inspiration vary. Across the diocese there is an emphasis on Youth and Young Adult programs. The Foundation has made 29 grants in this area in the last four years.

At St. Francis of Assisi, youth peer leaders engage with others and participate in sacramental prep and Vacation Bible School. The parish

Our parishes are committed to providing inviting, energizing worship experiences for these future leaders, and to supporting them as they integrate Catholic social teaching into their lives.


A FACELIFT FOR OUR CATHEDRAL

Earlier this year the exterior of the Cathedral Basilica of St. Joseph was completely repainted, funded in large part by grants from the Catholic Foundation. The Cathedral had not had a paint job since the renovation project in the late 1980s.
